Photography II	 Information for VA minors to consider: Students who are not particularly strong artists, and interested in Art History, should consider a minor in VA and a semester of study abroad (encouraged, but not required) Studio courses take large amounts of time, supplies and independent work. Doing the bare minimum will not equal success. VISU 200 and 202 should be taken as early as possible. Plan ahead spread out art history and studio courses, as skills are best developed when practiced consistently over time. If graduate work in Art History is planned, VA minors should ideally be taking German or French each term through the 300-level to develop reading proficiency. Students should compile samples of their work from each studio course for their professional or graduate portfolio. VA minors should schedule time to visit museums, galleries, lectures and openings. The study of visual arts provides students with valuable skills like observation and analysis which can be applied to other disciplines. Participation in co-curricular opportunities like the Student Museum Board, The Architectural Society or the Publications Office is encouraged depending on student interests.
