Important information for majors:

- No more than 6 credits at the 100-level may be applied toward any Economics degree.
- **All majors** should complete required Math courses during their **fresh. and so. years**, as they are pre-requisites for ECON 301 and could delay a timely graduation if not complete.
- ECON and BUSI numberings mean something! 100-level= 1st yr; 200-level= 2nd yr, after completing the 100-levels; 300-levels in jr. yr; 400-levels= sr. capstones
- Consider enrolling in ECON 161- Introduction to R and RStudio (3) after completing ECON 101 to facilitate your technical competencies with business analytics.
- Majors are encouraged to seek co-curricular opportunities through participation in the Fleming Center for Entrepreneurship, The Tiger Fund, Hobbie Business & Ethics Program, the Wilson Center and Philosophy Reading Group. Students should also take advantage of a Public Speaking class (or 2) as it will foster confidence in a variety of settings.
- Extra-curricular opportunities like Hammer House, managing club/organization budgets, attending presentations, networking opportunities, etiquette dinners and career fairs organized by the Ferguson Career Center will further your development and career preparedness.
- Interdisciplinary majors within the Social Sciences may be developed and pursued with the approval of the departments concerned.
