All 300-level & ↑ courses have a pre-requisite of any one of the following courses— any 100- or 200-level literature course in the English Department or the consent of the instructor. No more than 3 credits at the 100-level may be applied towards the English major.

Major coursework for current students taken at other institutions must be approved by the English Department in writing **prior to** enrollment in the course. Transfer and former students must obtain approval at entrance.

Important information for potential majors and ENGL majors to consider:

- Students interested in majoring in ENGL should seek out an ENGL faculty member early in their freshman or sophomore years to learn more about the major.
- First- and Second-year students are encouraged to take 100-level course offerings. Stronger first-years may wish to begin with a 200-level course like British or American survey.
- After 2 to 3 courses at the 100- or 200-level, students should attempt a 300-level ENGL course.
- ENGL majors should complete ENGL 380 and two 300-level courses prior to enrolling in the capstone courses (ENGL 480/481.)
- Students interested in an ENGL major should consider the Virgina Program in Oxford (VPO) after their sophomore or junior year. One of the VPO courses transfers back to H-SC as ENGL 301. See Prof. Kagan (Johns 201) or Dr. Widdows (Blake A, 100) for more information regarding the program.
- ENGL majors should speak with professors in the ENGL Department about summer research projects or with the Ferguson Career Center about internship possibilities. Additional co-curricular recommendations include: tutoring on campus or in the local schools, participating in the Writer's Roundtable, writing for the *Tiger* or for the *Garnet*, attending theatre performances or perhaps acting or a stagecraft role in campus and area productions.
- H-SC has a chapter of the national English hororary society, Sigma Tau Delta: ambitious, interested students may wish to approach the chair of the English Department about this society.
